My selection could change depending on the kind of event, the level of the dancers, the venue, the quality of the acoustic sound system and... my mood!

Every year the festival attracts danish enthusiasts as well as visitors from abroad. The volunteers, who help make the festival work, are also ardent dancers as well – with the exception of the two Larsen brothers, Ulf and Tom, who

manage the cloakroom at Kedelhallen. They are "not having any, thank you"!

Some time ago they were persuaded to join one of their tango dancing friends:

"It is great fun to participate and to meet all the dancers who turn up. They really are enthusiastic about the whole thing. You will meet people who first will go to several of the workshops, then they dance at the afternoon milonga, and finally they come here and dance until 4 o´clock in the morning...... and the next day the same all over again", says Ulf, the volunteer who never himself had the desire to take one single tango step.

However, Tom, his brother, has not just been observing. A couple of years ago he did try to learn the tango: "It IS very fascinating to watch the determination of the dancers. You really do it one hundred per cent! I am extremely impressed by the commitment you all show. That kind of energy is positively contagious. I did take a course and did try a couple of steps at home. But putting the many hours into it was just so enormously demanding. So it never amounted to any more than that", Tom says. Instead he and his brother spend their time in the cloakroom helping the visitors, quizzing and availing themselves to the wireless internet on the premises./LB

The only planning I do is done a long time before by ensuring a good music library, good sound equipment and working hardware and software.

During the DJ session I do my best to read the mood and the dancers, and aim for selecting the music they want to dance to at any moment - mostly by empathizing with the dancers and using $% \left(1\right) =1$ mould enjoy dancing to at any specific moment.

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
